

One Thousand Donated To Camp Mokule'ia

"On October 5, Rev. David Turner, Executive Director at Camp Mokule'ia, preached at St. Mary's. It was St. Francis Sunday, and Rev. Turner, preached about the audacity of St. Francis life and message.

St. Francis rejected the status quo of privilege that was his inheritance. Instead, he proclaimed a faith so deep that it could heal the theological rifts that were expressed in the Crusades.

He understood God's love to encompass — not just all humans but the entirety of Creation.



After his sermon, Rev. Turner was presented with a \$1,000 check from St. Mary's to be used towards the adoption of one of the Lodge Rooms at Camp Mokule'ia. St. Mary's is the first congregation to sponsor a room, and was lifted up as an example at the Diocesan Convention October 23rd and 24th. Hopefully, St. Mary's will inspire other churches to similarly invest in the camp."

The city's King Street Cycle Track pilot program is underway for completion hopefully by Thanksgiving, definitely by Christmas. The dedicated bike lane is from Alapai to Isenberg Street. The asphalt berm blocks to divide the cycle track from vehicle traffic fronting St. Mary's was installed on

Wednesday, October 29th. Until the city paints the on street parking stalls, no parking allowed on King Street.

Question: What is a cycle track?

Answer: Cycle tracks, also known as protected bike lanes or on-street bike paths, are bike lanes that are physically separated from traffic. The cycle track is positioned be-

tween the sidewalk and the on-street parking. They can be on the left or right and can be one-way or two-way.

Question: Why do we need cycle tracks?

Answer: The City is required to comply with the Complete Street ordinance and balance the needs of all road users; pedestrians, bicyclists and motorists. The City encourages more bicycling, which is a healthy and clean mode of transportation. The cycle track design makes bicycling safer and will attract more bicyclists that are not comfortable riding in traffic. Also, by providing a safer place for bicyclists, it will encourage them to ride in the roadway instead of the sidewalk, which will make the sidewalks safer for pedestrians.

The League of American Bicyclists recently published the bicycle mode share numbers for the 70 largest cities in America and Honolulu is ranked 9 nationwide. Currently, 2.4% of people in Honolulu commute to work by bicycle. The number has been increasing over time and we are confident that by providing safe bikeways even more people will choose to travel by bicycle.

Spot a Stroke



Face Drooping – Does one side of the face droop or is it numb? Ask the person to smile. Is the person's smile uneven?

Arm Weakness – Is one arm weak or numb? Ask the person to raise both arms. Does one arm drift downward?

Speech Difficulty – Is speech slurred? Is the person unable to speak or hard to understand? Ask the person to repeat a simple sentence, like "The sky is blue." Is the sentence repeated correctly?

Time to call 9-1-1 – If someone shows any of these symptoms, even if the symptoms go away, call 9-1-1 and get the person to the hospital immediately. Check the time so you'll know when the first symptoms appeared.
