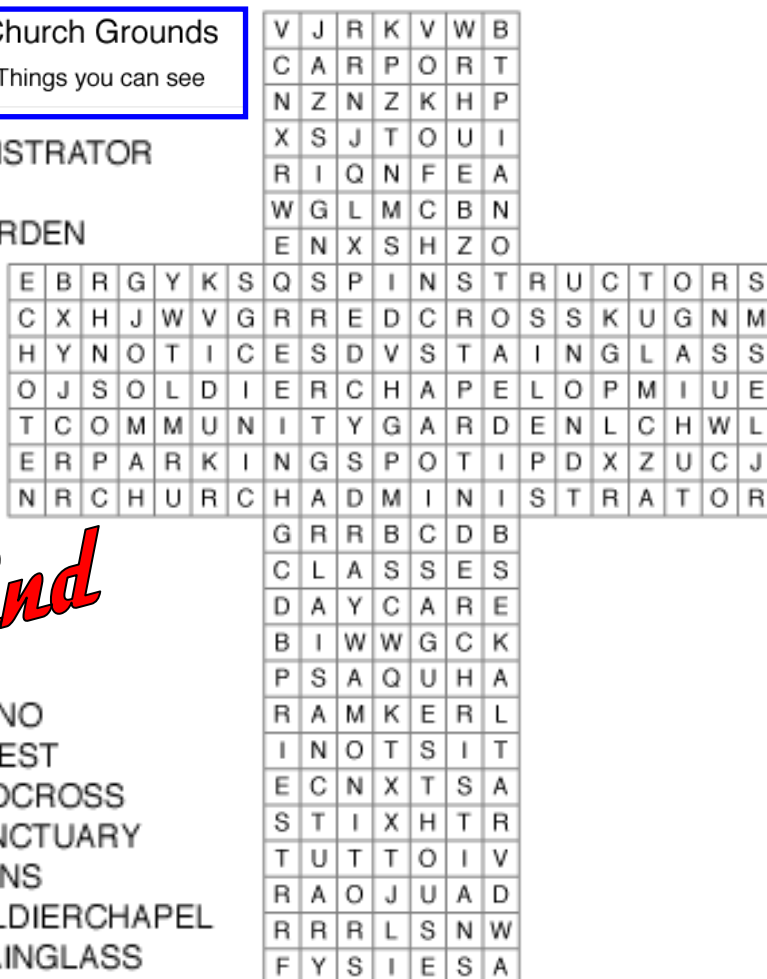


William Aulenbach

St. Mary's Episcopal Church is participating for the third year in the *Give Aloha, Foodland's Annual Community Matching Gifts Program*. This program honors Foodland's founder, Maurice J. "Sully" Sullivan, and continues his legacy of giving back to the community.

How It Works

From September 1-30 make donations to St. Mary's at any Foodland, Sack N Save and Foodland Farms location statewide. Foodland and the Western Union Foundation will match a portion of each donation made with a Maika'i card. Please ask family and friends to make a donation to St. Mary's.

How to Donate

- At checkout, present your Maika'i card (or give your 10-digit number) and inform the cashier that you would like to make a donation to **St. Mary's, code #78883**. If you do not have a Maika'i account, you can establish one by asking the cashier.
- Tell the cashier how much you would like to donate and it will be added to your grocery purchase total.
- You may donate up to a cumulative of \$249 over the course of several store visits (any amount over \$249 will not be matched).
- Be sure the cashier reaffirms our organization's name and amount that you are donating. Donations must be made payable to Foodland or Sack N Save.
- The name of our organization and amount will appear on your receipt.

Donations are Tax Deductible



WHAT DOES HAWAII FOODBANK DO?

The Hawaii Foodbank is the only nonprofit on Oahu that collects, warehouses and distributes massive quantities of both perishable and non-perishable food on a statewide basis.



WHAT ARE PARTNER AGENCIES?

These nonprofits are an essential link between the Foodbank and Hawaii's hungry. Member agencies receive food and other products from our warehouse and distribute them free of charge to people in need.

Member agencies include:

- Neighborhood food pantries
- Soup kitchens and meal programs
- Homeless and abuse shelters
- Rehabilitation centers
- Residential, senior and youth programs

WHERE WILL MY MONEY GO?

By sponsoring one of the Hawaii Foodbank member agencies, you are helping to fight hunger in your community.
