We want to educate, equip, and empower our lay persons in liturgy, music, and Bible education.




We are called to evangelize, to be inclusive, and welcoming to all people.

We want to continue and expand our homeless ministries, minister to the low income/working class people and seniors in our parish and those in the neighborhood.

In the 1910's, the area called Moiliili, a sleepy settlement on the outskirts of Honolulu, was chosen as a site for "mission work". A mission house was constructed in 1912 on the present site of St. Mary's parish buildings. Night classes for adults, a day school instructing girls in sewing and housekeeping skills, education in the Faith, and a free neighborhood medical dispensary were some of the first uses. The most visible ministry was the St. Mary's Home, an institution for the care of orphans and other homeless children. A church building was added in 1919.

In the late 1960s the congregation became a parish. In the mid-1980s St. Mary's constructed a new church building to accommodate the growing congregation. The former parish hall was converted into the main church, which is a modern building seating 200 in the sanctuary as well as containing the parish office, rector's office, large kitchen, and multipurpose gathering room. The original church has been preserved. It was renamed "Soldier Chapel" and is used for weekday services and private prayer and meditation. We also have a 3-bedroom house on church grounds and a 4-bedroom townhouse located in Hawaii Kai, both of which are being rented out.

In the early 1990s, the rector at that time, together with approximately half the congregation, felt morally obligated to disassociate themselves over certain positions gaining acceptance in the Episcopal Church (USA). Others chose to remain and continue the ministries of St. Mary's. Parishioners remained steadfast in their faith, moved past the divisions to become the loving ohana (Hawaiian for family) today.

Pastorally and spiritually, St. Mary's was led by a deacon, an interim priest and 3 rectors from 1994-2019. Our most recent rector retired in January 2019.

An 84-page book entitled "100 Years St. Mary's Episcopal Church 1902-2002" provides a history of that period and is available on our website.

St. Mary's at a Glance

St. Mary's is made up of a small warm ohana with a nucleus of long-term parishioners. Members are of various ethnic backgrounds, which is representative of the population in Hawaii. Most parishioners reside within a ten-mile radius of the church. St. Mary's attracts people from very diverse economic and occupational backgrounds.

In 2018, St. Mary's had the following:

- 75 Communicants in Good Standing
- 2 marriages
- 10 funerals
- 16 baptisms
- (January May 2019) 42 Average Sunday attendance; 58 Easter Sunday attendance

We celebrate with a traditional liturgical worship service, including scripture readings, sermons, songs, and liturgy. St. Mary's is a Eucharist-oriented parish. Holy Communion is celebrated every Sunday. While deeply rooted in the Episcopal tradition, we are open to other types of worship style. We are equipped with a piano, an organ, and audio/visual technology. Contemporary praise songs are sung at the beginning of the service and played during Communion, with traditional hymns interspersed throughout the worship service. Sermons are Biblebased and focused on relating Scripture to daily and spiritual life.

Ministries



We provide programs that promote wellness, free to church members and the community, including Warrior at Ease (yoga for veterans & family) and yoga class. We have a Native Hawaiian and Marian garden.

Wellness Ministries

In collaboration with Institute of Human Services, John A. Burns School of Medicine, Veterans Administration, HieHie Shower Mobile, and other social service agencies, St. Mary's is the site for monthly distribution of non-perishable food bags, toiletries, clothing, medical, and social services. Parishioners support an ongoing food pantry with donations of food items and monetary contributions. We also distribute sandwich sack lunches to the homeless in the neighborhood (pictured to the right).



Homeless Ministries



St. Mary's supports missionaries through prayers and financial assistance. Two other congregations, Hawaii Vision Presbyterian Church and Dignity Honolulu, use our church buildings as their primary place of worship. Our gathering room is used regularly by other Christian and community organizations, such as Housing First Support Group, Alcoholics Anonymous, and DeMello Group.

Other Ministries

Past ministries that we would like to explore reviving: Sunday School, Bible Study, Book Club, Centering Prayer, Gospel Singspiration, school supplies for needy neighborhood children, shoebox ministry with supplies to needy children abroad & locally, Food Fair/Rummage sale, Kupuna (Seniors) Programs (pictured to the right), He Mele Aloha (music lessons), Christmas Trolley, Parents Night Out, Family Promise, Honolulu Habitat for Humanity, World Vision-30 Hour Famine, and AmeriCorps Vista.


Culture and Environment


St. Mary's is located in Moiliili (a mixed residential and commercial neighborhood) on the Island of Oahu, which means the "Gathering Place." Spanning approximately 44 miles by 30 miles, it is the third largest of the eight major islands that make up Hawaii. With a population close to one million, it is by far the most populated island. Honolulu, its capital city, is the State's political, economic, military, educational, population, entertainment and cultural center.

Our culture is a reflection of our diverse heritage. Hawaii is the only state in the nation where no ethnic group represents a majority. Major influences from Caucasians, Japanese, Chinese, Filipinos, Koreans, Portuguese, Polynesian, Vietnamese, and others are clearly evident. Perhaps influenced by our year-round congenial climate, our scenic outdoors, and our melting-pot culture, our lifestyle is characteristically casual, aptly symbolized by the spirit of "Aloha", a Hawaiian word meaning love, welcome, and hospitality.

Hawaii's residents must contend with geographical isolation, heavy dependence on expenditures by government and visitors, and cost of living which is higher than the U.S. mainland average.
